



2023 Self Review Report

The Education Pastoral Care of Tertiary and International Learners Code of Practice 2021

Under the Education and Training Act 2020, it is a specific requirement that annual self-assessments of performance are undertaken and documented. The purpose of the [Code of Practice](#) is Learner Wellbeing and Safety. OCA staff and students have participated in an enquiry approach to what we do well / not so well and, what we should change in relation to OCA's practices to identify strengths, weaknesses and an action plan if needed.

There are four high level outcomes to be achieved.

- Two are under organisational structure and whole organisational approach:
 1. A learner wellbeing and safety system
 2. Learner Voice
- Two are under wellbeing and safety practices for all TEOs
 3. Safe, inclusive, supportive and accessible physical and digital learning environments
 4. Learners are safe and well.

During the Self Review OCA Staff and Students were asked evaluative questions relating to the four high level outcomes. Other sources of input were gathered to support stakeholder feedback. Over 50% of Student participated in the review and all OCA staff. An internal triangulation of the Code of Practice outcomes to OCA practices and supporting policies was also generated.

The 2023 review built on feedback from the 2022 review outcomes. Using a traffic light approach students rated their experience relating to each of the outcomes. The key question asked for each high level outcome **was how well** OCA met the indicators of achieving the outcome. A follow up question was **how we know** that we continue to meet the outcomes well.

Students strongly indicated that:

The OCA Whanau Ora approach and systems support their safety, health and wellbeing.

That staff provide an inclusive, supportive and accessible learning environment.

That the student voice is catered for by the application of many opportunities both formally and informally to offer feedback.

OCA operates an open and transparent reciprocal relationship with students. Concerns raised are dealt with promptly, no complaints have been received in 2023.
